FROM THE DESK OF PARISH PRIEST

HE IS NOT HERE: FOR HE IS RISEN." -MT. 28:6

Dear Parishioners, Devotees and Pilgrims of Our Lady of Velankanni,

As we look forward to celebrating Easter, we remember the purpose and the centrality of the truth that we celebrate. God's grand story of redemption, through His Son's victory over sin and death rests at the center of what we call the gospel.

On April 4th, 2021, people will celebrate all over the globe the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Why all the attention for an event that happened some 2,000 years ago? Why is Easter that big of a deal? Easter is important for lots of reasons. In 1 Corinthians 15:12, the Apostle Paul said this about the resurrection: But if it is preached that Christ has been raised from the dead, how can some of you say that there is no resurrection of the dead?

The April boasts the most solemn and sublime event of human history: The Resurrection of Jesus Christ – the Paschal mystery. Though the way to the Resurrection was the Via Crucis, the Sacrificial Lamb of God is now and forever Christ our Light, the Eternal high priest of the New Covenant. And his sorrowful mother, the Stabat Mater of Good Friday, is now the jubilant Mother of the Regina Caeli.

In the Gospel of Matthew we read how an angel appeared to the women at the tomb early that first Easter morning. The angel explained to them that Jesus was not there because he had been raised from the dead, just as he said! Matthew tells us that the women hurried away from the tomb, afraid yet filled with joy.

That's what the resurrection does. It takes our fear, our worry, our hurt, our sadness...and it puts it all into perspective.

The fact that Jesus is risen from the dead, that he was victorious over death and sin, is reason to celebrate. It's that fact that gives us joy despite our circumstances and through whatever we may face. What happened on that first Easter day still brings us joy and it still changes lives today.

We the members of Christ's Mystical Body exalt in the mystery by which we were redeemed. If in Baptism we were buried with Christ, so also we share in his resurrection. By his death we were reborn; "by his stripes we were healed." (Is 53:5) Easter, the epicenter of time, is the event that links time and eternity. It is indeed "the day the Lord has made; let us be glad and rejoice in it." (Ps 118:24)We continue throughout the entire month our cry, "Christ is risen, Christ is truly risen." Easter is the feast of feasts, the unalloyed joy and gladness of all Christians. Easter is the beginning of our story and this is our story: that that the grave is not a destination but a process; the cross is not an end but a means.

The following Sunday of Easters Sunday we celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday. The Feast of Divine Mercy offers us the opportunity to begin again as though we were newly baptized. The unfathomable mercy of God is made manifest today if we but accept His most gracious offer.

"As a gift to humanity, which sometimes seems bewildered and overwhelmed by the power of evil, selfishness, and fear, the Risen Lord offers His love that pardons, reconciles, and reopens hearts to love. It is a love that converts hearts and gives peace. How much the world needs to understand and accept Divine Mercy! Lord, who reveals the Father's love by your death and Resurrection, we believe in you and confidently repeat to you today: Jesus, I trust in you, have mercy upon us and upon the whole world." April 25th - 4th Sunday of Easter	The Gospel is about Jesus as the Good Shepherd.
